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## Introduction

In this pedigree the line of Miler Magrath is shown as branching off that of the Dal-g-Cais Macraiths of Co. Clare. This is not correct. Miler is descended from the Magraths of Co. Fermanagh in the northern part of Ireland. It was his appointment as the Protestant Archbishop of Cashel in 1571, by Queen Elizabeth I, that brought him and his entourage to Co. Tipperary. During the transplants which followed the suppression of the Rebellion of 1641 by Oliver Cromwell several of Milers grandchildren were re-settled in Co. Clare. This has helped muddy the waters as to his family's origins since Co. Clare was the ancestral territory of the Thomond Macraiths.

The portion of the pedigree that deals with Miler's descendants is the main interest here. The material was copied from a microfilm reader at the Local Studies Center, Ennis, Co. Clare. The original was larger than could be viewed legibly in a single microfilm view and therefore the original document needed to be moved around and many photo copies were made. Capturing the entire document took nine years and two trips to Ireland - it seemed like there was always a corner or an edge that was still missing. The final result is contained on 15 pages of this PDF document. Reading it is much like putting together a jigsaw puzzle but without the picture on the cover of the box to guide you.
