Denis McGrath and Catherine Quigley

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Introduction

Denis McGrath supposedly came to the US from Ireland in 1858 at the age of 22. However, the first record of his presence was his marriage to Catherine Quigley in May 1861. According to the 1900 census Catherine came to the US from Ireland in 1860 and there was an 1860 census record of a 25- year-old Catherine Quigley living with a Dobin family in Homer, Cortland County, NY.

Papers related to Denis' military service provide his enlistment date as a private in the 122nd Regiment of N.Y. as August 15, 1862. He received an honorable discharge from the same on June 16, 1865. In May of 1864 Denis was taken as a prisoner of war at the Rapidan River in Virginia during the Battle of the Wilderness and ended up at Andersonville and then Florence, So. Carolina. They moved some of the sickest prisoners to Florence because they feared General Sherman who was well on his way through Atlanta. Denis came home a broken and very sick man and he could never sleep in a bed again and always slept on the floor.

A draft exemption document, dated August 15, 1866, showed that Denis was living in Fabius at that time. Denis has been found in the 1865 and 1870 census for the town of Fabius, Onondaga County, NY. He never fully recovered from the war or his time as a prisoner of war. He ended up at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, where they sent Civil War veterans for treatment. Denis died at the hospital in May of 1871.

After the death of her husband, Catherine was left with three young daughters to care for and support. There was Mary (7), Julia (5) and Margaret, who was born in 1872. It is possible that Catherine might have been pregnant with Margaret when Denis died. In the 1875 census the family was found in the 6th Ward of the city of Syracuse. The three girls were in the St. Vincent's Orphanage in Syracuse from approximately November 1873 to November 1876. Mary (12), Julia (7), and Margaret (4) McGrath were listed as inmates at St. Vincent's in the 1875 census. Also in the 6th Ward at the time was a 38-year-old Ireland born widow by the name of Catherine McGraw, who was residing and doing "house work" in a hotel. By 1880 Catherine and her girls were back together in Homer, NY. Over the next two decades the girls left home, married and started their own families.

Mary Ficarra was the granddaughter of Mary Agatha Nichols. Her mother (Catherine) would talk to her about her Aunt Mag and Aunt Julia. She told her how *she would ride the stagecoach down to Pompey and Cardiff to visit her aunt and uncle*, who was a Blacksmith. She had left a trunk at her Aunt Julia's when she was a young girl. The trunk contained so much information about her family including a picture of her grandfather in his civil war uniform. She (Catherine) was only in her early twenties when her mother (Mary Agatha) died. Her father had died earlier when she was only a very young girl so she just never went back and got that trunk. She regretted it until the day she died. Her whole family history was in it.

The Story of Denis and Catherine

According to the 1900 Cortland Co. Census, Kate Quigley emigrated to the U.S. from Ireland in 1860. Denis McGrath arrived in the US at the age of 22 according to his g-granddaughter or in about 1857 as determined from his age of 35 in the 1870 census. Kate married Denis McGrath on Nov. 13, 1861 at St. James Church in Cazenovia, Madison Co., NY. Witnesses were John Gorman and Johanna Gorman. The priest Bonaventure Carney performed the ceremony. This marriage record is the earliest record of Denis and Kate's presence in central New York.

On July 22, 1862 authority was given to raise the 122nd Regiment of New York Volunteer Infantry. Co. K was recruited principally at Syracuse, Tully, Skaneateles and Cicero. They were mustered in the service of the United States for three years on August 28, 1862. One of the individuals in this unit was Private Denis McGrath.


According to Denis' g-granddaughter, Mary Ficarra, in May of 1864 he was taken as a prisoner of war at the Rapidan River in Virginia during the Battle of the Wilderness and ended up at Andersonville and then Florence, So. Carolina. They moved some of the sickest prisoners to Florence because they feared General Sherman who was well on his way through Atlanta. After he received an honorable discharge on June 16, 1865, he came home a broken and very sick man. Mary's mother (Catherine Margaret) also told her children how her mother (Mary Agatha) told them that when Denis returned from the Civil War he could never sleep in a bed again and always slept on the floor. Denis ended up at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, where he died in May of 1871.

Their daughter Mary was born Dec. 25, 1864 and she was baptized on Jan. 16, 1865 at Pompey according to the St. James church records. The sponsors were Patrick and Catherine Hefferon (Heffernan?). The priest was P. C. Brady. There are no baptism records for their other children in the St. James records. At the time of the 1865 census Denis, Catherine and their 6 month old daughter Mary were living with the William Hamlin family in the town of Fabius. The census said that Catherine had given birth to 2 children, one of whom had apparently died in infancy.

At the time of the 1870 census Denis and Kate and their daughters Mary and Julia were residing on the west road out of the village of Fabius. After the death of her husband, Kate placed her three daughters into the St. Vincent's Orphanage in Syracuse from approximately November 1873 to November 1876. This was according to a bill from St. Vincent's to the town of Fabius Overseer of the Poor. Mary (12), Julia (7), and Margaret (4) McGrath were listed as inmates at St. Vincent's in the 1875 census. Also in the 6th Ward at the time of the 1875 census was a 38-year-old Ireland born widow by the name of Catherine McGraw, who was residing and doing "house work" in a hotel.

By 1880 Kate and her daughters were back together again and they were in Homer, NY. The family was living in a home on 2.62 acres of land that Kate had purchased from Orville Haight and his wife for \$550. In April 1885 Kate sold the Homer location and didn't purchase another house until October 1888. Where the family was living during the three years in between is not known. This new house, purchased in 1888, was in the city of Cortland at No. 3 Doubleday Street and cost her \$1,000. In 1891 Kate purchased a 122' x 10' strip of land adjacent to the north side of her Doubleday Street property for \$65, to enlarge her lot.

At the time of the 1892 NYS census Kate was still living at No. 3 Doubleday. Mary and Margaret, her oldest and youngest daughters, respectively, were both living elsewhere. At home was her middle daughter Julia who had married and was identified in the census as "A. S. Barber." Also living there were Julia's two children, Carrie (4) and Edward (3). Given the uncertainties in the 1892 census two additional persons might have also been living at No. 3 Doubleday. The census didn't distinguish separate households and didn't give any information on relationship and these following two persons were listed right after Kate's family. Therefore T. Quigley (25) might have been related to the family, especially since Kate's maiden name had been Quigley. Also J. Dobbins (32) might be the "John Dobbin," age 2, who was a member of the family where Catherine was boarding in 1860.

In the following paper the story of this family will be told by the paper trail that they left behind. These will include census records, land deeds, newspaper articles, cemetery records and a variety of other records. An attempt will be made to reconcile family lore with the records.

Where Are Denis and Catherine Buried?

The newspaper archive at the Fulton History site (over 50,000,000 pages) was searched and an obit for Catherine was found but none for Denis. https://fultonhistory.com/Fulton.html

The Cortland Evening Standard, Cortland, NY, Saturday, August 4, 1900

-Mrs. Catharine McGrath died of apoplexy at her home, 3 Doubleday-st., last night at 8 o'clock, aged 61 years. The funeral will be held at her late home at 9 o'clock Monday morning and at 9:30 at St. Mary's church.

Since Catherine's funeral was held at St. Mary's Church, one would assume that she had been buried in St. Mary's Cemetery. However I searched the Find A Grave site for St. Mary's and I couldn't find a grave for Catherine or Denis. I contacted the cemetery directly and they informed me that the cemetery had 8000+ graves and they had all been entered into the Find A Grave database. I then spoke with Kate O'Connell of the Cortland Historical Society. It was Kate and her mother who had transcribed the gravestone inscriptions at St. Mary's and then submitted the data to the Find-A Grave folks. She then searched through the society's collection of obits and she couldn't find Catherine. Therefore it is safe to say that neither Catherine nor Denis (he was always a long shot) are buried in St. Mary's Cemetery.

The entire Find A Grave site was searched for all cemeteries and for all the spelling variations of the names and no individuals were found that might be this Denis and Catherine McGrath. https://www.findagrave.com/

As for Denis you might try the County Clerk for Rochester and see if they have a death "certificate" for him. That's a long shot since Denis died in 1872 and the state didn't start death registrations until 1880. "Starting in June 1880, New York required that village, town, and city registrars to record deaths. Copies of these deaths were then filed with the State Department of Health."

Census Records

Denis McGrath and Kate Quigley

The **1860** census records for the towns of Fabius and Pompey were searched page by page and no McGraws, McGraths or Quigleys were found.

The **1865** census for the town of <u>Fabius</u> is missing from the Ancestry.com collection. All three sections of the **1865** census for the town of <u>Pompey</u> were searched and there were no McGraws, McGraths, or Quigleys.

It appears that Catherine and Denis had a child before Mary who was no longer alive.

From the same 1865 census (on page 16), in reference to Denis McGrath's military record - Unit: 122 NY Regiment, Date first entering service: Aug 20th 1862 at rank of Private. 34 months of service. Discharged in good health, without wounds. "Prisoner of war for 7 months"

The sequence of names in the 1870 census around Denis McGraw were as follows: Hiram Clark (119), Isaiah Rhodes (120), Angel Nye (121), Denis McGraw (122), Arteus Cleveland (123), George Kennedy (124), Erskine Squares (125). Although Denis was not on the 1874 Fabius map, based on this census sequence, it is probable that in 1870 Denis was occupying the "E. Harris" farm on the west road out of Fabius.

The residence next to the Thomas Ryan family is vacant in the 1875 census. In 1880, Catherine McGrath and her three daughters were living there next to the Ryan family. All three 1875 Homer ED census districts were searched by hand and there were no McGraws or McGraths found. Even the "Mrs. McGraw" found on the 1876 town of Homer map (Lot 44) was not found.

Both ED's in the **1875** Fabius census were searched and there were no McGraws or McGraths. Catherine and her daughter were found in the 6th Ward of Syracuse in the 1875 census.

We see that Denis must have died some time before the 1880 census (actually in May 1871). Johanna was probably the same person as the Julia from the 1870 census. At the time of the 1880 census Kate was also widowed and living with her in Homer with three females that were recorded as her daughters: Mary, Johanna and Margeret (sic).

Living next to the McGraw family was the Thomas Ryan family. They were the only other Irish family nearby – perhaps there was some relationship there. I searched Homer in the 1900 census and the Thomas Ryan family was no longer there. So far it hasn't been possible to connect these Ryans to any of the other Upperchurch Ryans in the tri-county area.

Quigley and Dobbins might not be living with Kate McGraw. The 1892 census did not distinguish separate households and did not give relationships.

Kate McGrath was living at 3 Doubleday St. (near Arthur Ave.) in the city of Cortland with her two grandchildren Carrie and Edward Barber. Strangely Kate claimed that she was the mother of two children and that only one of them was still alive at the time of the 1900 census (June 7, 1900). [This is wrong. Kate had three children, all daughters.] All three of her daughters

were still alive when they sold her Doubleday house in 1909. Kate immigrated in 1860 (40 years in U.S.). She spoke English but didn't read or write it. The census said that she rented her house despite the fact she had purchased it in 1888 and it remained in her possession, or that of her three daughters, after her death in August 1900, until it was sold in 1908.

The presence of this family, specifically Denis, still in the Albany area at the time of the 1865 census demonstrates that this Denis is **NOT** the one of interest in this paper.

The Albany County area was searched for this same family in the **1870** census and they were not found with either Michael or Mary as the head of the household. The individual children could not be found either, although the girls could have married which would have rendered them unfindable in the census without knowing their married names. Another Dennis McGrath was found in West Troy, Albany County. This Dennis had also married a woman named Catherine but they had a child who was 9 years old so they would have been married in

1865 when the other Dennis, son of Michael and Mary, was still living with his parents. And of course, neither can be the Denis who is the subject of this story.

There was a Dennis McGrath in the 1860 census for Kingston in Ulster County, NY. This could be our Denis since the age is right and he was born in Ireland. By traveling alone his family connections can't be used for identification purposes.

There is still a Dennis McGrath in Ulster County at the time of the 1870 census. If he is the same Dennis from the 1860 census he has only aged 6 years between the censuses. However, census ages are notoriously inaccurate. Since he is in Ulster County in 1870 **he can't be** the Denis of interest in this paper but he did marry a Catherine.

This Denis (b. 1840) was not found in Albany in 1865 or 1870. In 1865 Daniel was still living in the 9th Ward of Albany but his son Dennis was not found in Albany. This family was found in the immigration records and they arrived in NYC in July 1851 (See "Immigration Records" section of this paper). The reason that this is probably not the Fabius Denis McGrath is that the Fabius Denis never demonstrated any butchering skills and his Army enlistment papers listed his parents as Michael McGrath and Mary Ryan.

This Dennis McGraw (b. 1836) was not found in Kingston in 1865 or 1870.

This might our Catherine Quigley, since she is of the right age and was born Ireland. Curiously, in 1892, there was a 32-year-old "J. Dobbins" living at Kate's home at No. 3 Doubleday Street, Cortland, NY. This person would have been born in about 1860. In the 1860 census above, there is a "John Dobbin" who would have been born in 1858 — it could be the same person.

According to the 1900 census Catherine Quigley came to the US in 1860 and here is a possible candidate. How did Denis and Catherine meet? Since they married in 1861 it could be assumed that they met soon after she arrived — also assuming that they hadn't met previously back in Ireland. Therefore it might be assumed that Denis was residing nearby Catherine's residence in 1860. The 1860 census for the town of Homer was searched page by page (112 images) and no Denis McGrath was found.

Irish Records

Denis McGrath

It has been assumed that Denis McGrath had come from Co. Tipperary in Ireland. In the area around Pompey and Fabius in Onondaga County there were many families and individuals who had come from the area around Upperchurch parish, Co. Tipperary.

His first verifiable appearance in the US records was his 1861 marriage to Kate Quigley at St. James Church in Cazenovia, Madison County, NY. At that early time several of the churches around St. James were considered missions and the people went to St. James for baptisms and marriages.

The following baptisms were the only Denis McGraths of the proper age that could be found in the area of Co. Tipperary. Neither of these records contained a place of residence, i.e. a townland. Therefore it isn't possible to trace either of these families in the land records of the time.

The parishes of Clonoulty, Drom & Inch, and Upperchurch & Drombane were also searched and there were no other Denis McGraths which fit the profile. There were also no other Michael McGrath and Mary Ryan couples. Michael and Mary either had only one child or left Ireland before having any other children.

The Irish Naming Convention

Not everyone follows this convention but in the 1800 it was followed fairly close. In brief the first son and daughters are named after the paternal grandparents. The second son and daughter are named after the maternal grandparents. Denis and Kate McGrath had sons and three daughters who were named Mary, Julia (Johanna), and Margaret. This naming of the first daughter Mary might be looked upon evidence, although very weak evidence, that Michael McGrath and Mary Ryan were Denis' parents. It this is true then it points to Kate Quigley's mother being Julia or Johanna. Interesting, but not compelling.



Borrisoleigh RC parish, Co. Tipperary. Catharine was baptized on Nov 9, 1838. Catharine's parents were Patrick Quigley and Kitty Ryan. They were living in the townland of Balliroon (Ballyraun); in Glenkeen civil parish, just northeast of the village of Borrisoleigh.

It cannot be known with certainty that this Catharine Quigley is the same person who married Denis McGrath in 1861. However, it is possible to find out more about where this Quigley family lived in Ireland. The table below, from Griffith's Valuation, displays the occupiers of the townland Ballyroan in about 1850. There was a Patrick Quigley who occupied a house and a very small garden. Anne Quigley is most likely a relative to Patrick, perhaps his mother. Both Quigley's are leasing from James Ryan who might be related to Patrick's wife, Kitty Ryan.


This map shows the location of the townland of Ballyroan, in the civil parish of Glenkeen, relative to the village of Borrisoleigh.

Summary

The original assumption was that Denis and Catherine had both come from the central portion of Co. Tipperary. This was based only on the large number of other Irish immigrants from that area who had already settled in central NY. Denis and Catherine appear to be lone immigrants who are notoriously difficult to trace back to Ireland. What has been shown in this section of the paper has been a demonstration of the methodology for searching the Irish records to determine a point of origin. As the information on the family in the US grows, it is always hoped that a clue will show up that will assist the search back in Ireland.

One such clue showed up in the 1930 census record for Margaret Hackett. In that record Margaret stated that both of her parents had been born in Northern Ireland. This was a distinction that didn't exist until the civil war in Ireland in the early 1920s. Another clue, a rather subtle one, can be found in the 1865 census for the town of Fabius. The census enumerators employed in the mid-19th century were sometimes lacking in handwriting and spelling skills which present a real challenge to the census indexers — not to mention those of us looking for our ancestors. However, in this particular case — 1865 Fabius — Deforest W. Glass might have done us a favor. His hand writing was among the best I've seen in my years of reading census records, but he wrote down the names according to how they sounded to him. For example, Edmond Ryan became "Edman Rion" at the hand of Mr. Glass. For Denis McGrath it became "Denace Magrauh."

In that spelling is a possible clue to Denis' point of origin in Ireland. The sound that Mr. Glass heard is indicative of the harsher Northern Ireland accent — acquired from the Scots who came to Northern Ireland during the plantations of the 1600s. A southern Ireland accent would have caused Mr. Glass to write something such as "Magra."



The map above is an Ordnance Survey map that was constructed in the early 1840s to assist in the Griffith Valuation. The entire townland of Ballyroan is only 79 acres. The cluster of buildings surrounded by trees is probably occupied by the Laffin family who owned (were the "Immediate Lessors") most of the land in the townland. The other folks most likely occupied the four other structures scattered around the townland.



This modern image (2017) of the townland of Ballyroan shows that many of the field structures appearing in the 1840s OS map above can still be identified today.

The list above was assembled from the immigration records for New York City assuming that most of the Irish that settled in the New York area entered the country from this port. The search was limited to birth years 1830-1842. This produced 11 individuals named Dennis McGrath, some of who were lone travelers and others who traveled with similarly surnamed individuals. The Dennis McGrath of interest in this paper was probably a lone traveler since no other siblings or parents have been found in researching him. This lack of associations makes lone travelers the hardest to identify since the immigration lists contain very little information.











Quigley and Dobbins might not be living with Kate McGraw. The 1892 census did not distinguish separate households and did not give relationships. It is curious as to why Julia chose to go by the initials "A.S." In another record she was listed as Julia L.

No record has been found of Julia's marriage, her husband Barber's first name, or what happened to him. She was married to Barber about 1887-8. In the 1911 census she listed her marital status as "widow." A search of the Fulton History newspaper archive did not find an obit for an appropriate Barber candidate — time frame: 1887-1892. The Find-A-Grave database didn't produce an appropriate Barber candidate — time frame was 1885-1895.

This cannot be the correct Julia Barber. The daughter of Dennis and Catherine was born in 1866, she was married in about 1887 and she had two children who later out lived her. In 1910 another "young" Julia Barber was found who did turn out to be the daughter of Denis and Catherine McGrath. Perhaps this 1900 Julia is the same one as the 1910 Julia and she is trying to cover up her past by knocking 8 years off her age, and her marriage and pretending her children don't exist — which from their point of view is the case with their mother.


On Thursday, January 28, 1910, George Barber, age 2 years, 3 months, son of Mrs. Julia Barber of No. 411 South West Street died at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon at the Syracuse Hospital for Women and Children as a result, it is claimed of having swallowed a quantity of oil of wintergreen. Less than three month later Julia's last name was listed as Rice by the census enumerator.

Julia McGrath Barber was born in 1866 and in 1910 she would have been 44 years old, as opposed to the age of 34 which appears in the 1910 census. This might bring into question the identification of this Julia as the daughter of Denis and Kate McGrath. However, the following obit removes that doubt.

Julia's husband, Cornelius Rice, died in 1934 and he was also buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery, Auburn, NY. The reason for the connection to Auburn is that Cornelius' family is from that area. As for the surviving nieces and nephews, they can all be accounted for with the exception of one niece. By process of elimination this missing niece should be a daughter of Margaret Graff or Hackett. However Margaret had no known children.







There appears to be a problem with the orientation of the Sanborn map above. On the previous page there is a modern map whose orientation has north pointing up the page. This gives Grace Street a north-south orientation. On the Sanborn map Grace Street has an east-west orientation. The following both explains and confuses the situation, at the same time.

This is an attempt to determine the sequence of events, described by several census records, which led to the evolution of Margaret McGrath's surname from McGrath to Graff and finally to Hackett. The census records for the Graff, Hackett and Parcells families are in the appendix. The transition between McGrath and Graff took place between June 1, 1905 and November 8, 1908. By April 15, 1910 Anthony (Anton) Graff and his wife Mary are living apart. Frank Hackett and his new bride (married October, 1909) are living together. Also on the same date Frank's former wife, Mary Hackett and the 5 children were still living at the same location as in 1905 but her husband has moved on. By June 1, 1915 Anthony Graff has remarried to the former Alice Parcelles and her children from her previous marriage are living with them along with a new child of their own. Also on this date in 1915 Frank and Margaret are living in Gilbertsville, Otsego Co. They have no children of their own but Margaret's nephew Harry Nichols (son of Mary Agnes Nichols) is living with them. It would appear that Margaret had broken up two families in a very short period of time, before settling down. Whether Margaret was the cause of the breakup of the Graff and Hackett marriages, or whether she just came along

at the right time, is uncertain. However, the transition from Graff to Hackett was extremely quick.

This implies that Maggie got married sometime between the 1905 census and 1908 when her married name Graff appeared on the deed for the sale of her mother's Cortland house on Doubleday Street.

By November 1908 Margaret was supposedly married to a man named Graff and was residing in Cardiff, Onondaga County NY, a small hamlet, located a few miles southwest of LaFayette, on Route 20.

According to the Fayetteville Cemetery records, Margaret purchased the plots (Section 12, Block 34S) and her deceased husband Frank Hackett was interred there. In the records at the Fayetteville Cemetery there is a "No burial?" notation next to Margaret's name. Frank Hackett's funeral had been handled by the Eaton-Tubbs Funeral Home (now Schepps Family Funeral Home) and they have records of Frank Hackett's funeral. However, they have no records of handling the funeral services of Margaret F. Hackett. So, exactly where is Margaret buried?

The letters "S, M, Wd" refer to the marital status of the sisters during the year in that row. "M1" and "M2" indicate first and second marriages respectively. "Unknown" means that a search was made of the census for those years using all the obvious variations of name spellings and the individual was not found. Grape Street later became South Townsend Street.

The 1905 entry for Mary was from a death notice in the paper for her son Richard. The 1908 entry for Margaret came from a deed for the sale of her mother's house in Cortland, NY.

"My mother would talk to me about her <u>Aunt Mag</u> and <u>Aunt Julia</u>. She told us how *she would* ride the stagecoach down to <u>Pompey</u> and <u>Cardiff</u> to visit her aunt and uncle. Her uncle was a Blacksmith." - Mary Ficarra



The blue ovals on the above map show O(rville) Haight, C. O. Newton, Mrs. (Hannah) Hill. Haight and his wife Clara were the Grantors in the sale to Catherine McGrath. Newton's and Hill's property bordered the land purchased by McGrath. Interestingly, there is a Mrs. McGraw located on the southeast corner of the intersection of what is now Cayuga Street and South West Street, just across the street from Glenwood Cemetery. In the 1880 purchase of the Haight property Catherine McGrath was described as a resident of the town of Truxton. Could she have already been living on Lot 44 in Homer in 1876?







Notes

1. Both census sources are indexed and neither found a record for Mary Nichols. The individual might still be listed in the census under a non-obvious misspelling of the name. If the geographical area of interest is small enough it quite often pays off to go through that part of the census page by page. For Mary Nichols it could be reasonably assumed that she was still in the 16th ward of Syracuse at the time of the 1915 census. However, Ancestry was missing the census returns for that ward. The LDS index, which had access to the 16th ward, didn't produce a hit for Mary. Ordinarily the next step would be to go through the images of the census at that source, page by page. However, LDS only had an index to the 1915 census and not the images. Anyone looking for the images was referred to the LDS partner, Ancestry. But Ancestry doesn't have the 16th ward data or images. A possible solution would be to contact the Onondaga County Clerk's Office — they might have a complete hard copy of the 1915 census.

8-11-21

I do not know what happened to Mr. Barber, but later on, in 1910, I find her (Julia Barber) as head of a house, no children listed with a roomer by the name of Cornelius Rice. She eventually marries him and dies on 12/29/32 in Auburn, NY, where she is buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery. Her obit said she was survived by two children, son, Edward and daughter, Cary both of Ft. William, Ontario. So that is a little mystery. Why did they go to live with their grandmother and how did they end up in Canada.

I also know that my other great aunt listed as <u>Margaret Groff</u> on the deed, later became <u>Margaret Hackett</u>.

I did find a <u>Frank and Margaret Hackett</u> in the <u>1880 census</u> living in Truxton Village, Cortland County. The ages were 24 and 21 which would make sense. How she became Groff????????

[Comment: Margaret Hackett, daughter of Denis McGrath and Catherine Quigley was born in 1871. The Truxton Margaret Hackett was born in 1859.]

In the <u>1930</u> census there was a <u>Margaret Hackett</u> listed as a <u>widow</u> in the town of <u>Manlius</u>.

5-08-18

I do know that Dennis's parents were <u>Michael McGrath</u> and <u>Mary Ryan</u>.

I also found out my <u>Great Aunt Julia (JoAnna)</u> remarried and is buried in a <u>cemetery in Auburn NY</u> not too far from me here in Camillus.

2-24-15

I do believe my great aunts Julia and Margaret were temporarily put in <u>St. Vincent's orphanage</u>. Somewhere in my search I came across this information.

I am still struggling with the Irish records. Dennis' parents were <u>Michael McGrath</u> and <u>Mary Ryan</u> and those names are very common.

[Comment: What records allowed you to nail down these names?]

My great grandfather, Dennis McGrath has become a dear old friend.

7-05-12

Because of the information you gave me to begin with I was able to research all of <u>Dennis' civil</u> <u>war records</u> and experience.

He <u>came over during the potato blight</u> only to enlist at the age of <u>22 years</u>.

[Comment: Is this Denis' age upon arrival in the US or his age at enlistment? The age is a better fit for his arrival age. Denis arrived in 1857, based on being born in 1835. Denis enlisted on August 28, 1862, at the age of about 27. The potato blight was approximately 1846-1850, when Denis was 11 to 15 years old.]

In <u>May of 1864</u> he was taken as a prisoner of war at the <u>Rapidan River</u> in Virginia during the Battle of the Wilderness and ended up at Andersonville and then Florence, So. Carolina.

They moved some of the sickest prisoners to Florence because they feared General Sherman who was well on his way through Atlanta. When he was <u>released in 1865</u>, he came home a broken and very sick man.

He ended up at <u>St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester</u> where he died in <u>May of 1871</u> at the age of <u>31</u> years.

[Comment: This implies Denis was born in 1840. If his ages from his appearances in the 1865 and 1870 are averaged his birth year was 1836, which would have made him 35 at the time of his death.]

I also found out that his father's name was Michael McGrath and his mother was Mary Ryan.

[Comment: What was the record that provided this information?]

I have not found Quigley's in Upperchurch but I did find a <u>Catherine Quigley</u>, age <u>25</u> living with a <u>Dobin family in Homer</u>, <u>NY</u>. This was on the <u>1860 Census</u>.

She would have married Dennis in 1861 and after he died she did end up in the Homer, Cortland area.

One thing I did learn that I am fortunate enough to have come from very strong women. My great grandmother was a young widow with children, my grandmother Mary Agatha was left a young widow with children and my own mother Catherine was definitely the center of our family and kept us all together.

5-07-04

I am so excited now about getting started and finding out more information about my grandfather, Dennis.

With the information you have given me I can at least have a starting place. I was going to work my way backwards because I know that when my grandmother <u>Mary Agatha McGrath</u> married <u>Delancey Perry Nichols</u> they moved to <u>Newark Valley</u> where my mother and her brother were born in 1900 and 1901. They then left Newark Valley and moved to Syracuse on <u>Irving Avenue</u> where my <u>grandfather</u> was a <u>carpenter</u> for the <u>Elgin Simons Furniture Factory</u>

He died when my mother was around 12 of Tuberculosis.

This will be my first trip over there. Thank you again. It means so much to me to have this information.

5-03-04

I wish I could see you and tell you in person how very grateful I am with the information you sent me. Dennis and Catherine are indeed my great grandparents.

My mother would talk to me about her <u>Aunt Mag</u> and <u>Aunt Julia</u>. She told us how *she would* ride the stagecoach down to Pompey and Cardiff to visit her aunt and uncle. Her uncle was a Blacksmith.

She left a trunk at her Aunt Julia's when she was a young girl. The trunk contained so much information about her family including a picture of her grandfather in his civil war uniform.

She (Mary's mother) was only in her early twenties when her mother (<u>Mary Agatha died</u>) and her father died when she was only a very young girl so she just never went back and got that trunk. She regretted it until the day she died. Her whole family history was in it.

My mother (<u>Catherine Margaret</u>) also told us how her mother told them that when Dennis returned from the Civil War he could never sleep in a bed again and always slept on the floor.

I have been searching for months and as you probably discovered, when there is incorrect information on a document it can send you back for months trying to research. As I said when I

first sent you the email, my grandmother's death certificate listed her father as Jno McGrath, yet my mother had told me her grandfather was <u>Dennis McGraw</u>.

4-29-04

My name is Mary Ficarra and I live in Camillus, NY. I am the retired Assessor in the Town of Camillus and at the time I almost called your relative Mr. Currier. I have enjoyed reading "The Origins of the McGrath Family" on your web site. I just discovered it today. I knew that there was different spellings of the McGrath name and I also knew there was some connection with the McGraws.

My grandmother's maiden name was Mary Agatha McGrath.

I know that she attended <u>Homer Academy</u> as of <u>1/20/1883</u> and was born in Cortland, NY <u>December 20th,1866</u>.

She died before I ever knew her on <u>January 27th</u>, <u>1924</u> in Syracuse, NY.

The only name I have on her <u>death certificate</u> [grandmother] was <u>her father's name which was Jno McGrath</u>, born in Ireland. It is my understanding that <u>Jno</u> is a short version of <u>John</u> or Jonathan etc.

My mother said her grandfather was <u>Dennis McGraw</u> and he fought in the <u>Civil War</u>. I can't seem to connect this with <u>Jno</u>.

My mother use to tell us that her <u>mother's cousin was John McGraw</u>, the great NY Giant's manager.

My grandmother married <u>Delancey Perry Nichols</u> sometime around <u>1898 or 1899</u>.

My grandmother's maiden name was McGrath on her school document.

My mother also said her grandmother's maiden name was Quigley.


