SHERIFF LEADS RAID ON FORMER HOME OF NISTICO

PREMISES OCCUPIED BY BROTHER SALVATORE ARE SEARCHED FOR LIQUOR UNCLE IS ARRESTED

POLICE ALLEGE TONY GIDARI, HERE FOR FUNERAL, CARRIED REVOLVER.

Sheriff Ten Eyck, with deputy sheriffs and police, acting for the district attorney, raided the premises at 107 Kirkpatrick street late last night, the home of Salvatore Nistico, brother of Bruno Nistico, killed Monday night in a police ambush and buried yesterday morning.

The raiders ransacked the house for liquor, it was given out, but found none. They arrested Tony Gidari of Buffalo, an uncle of Bruno Nistico, and one of the mourners at his funeral. Gidari had a gun, the police alleged today. He came from Buffalo yesterday morning to attend his nephew's funeral at St. Peter's church.

Until three weeks before his death, Bruno lived at his brother's home. What besides liquor might have been suspected to be there was not given out officially. The raid was on a search warrant obtained from Justice Barnum.

Sheriff Ten Eyck, George Ten Eyck, Emmet Burns, deputies, and Motorcycle Patrolman Coon, Saroney and Marte made the raid at 9 o'clock. It was attended by high excitement in the neighborhood.

The development was the only one that became public overnight in the prosecutor's investigation of the circumstances that led to the death of Bruno Nistico and followed it Monday night at the Faatz hotel in the Cicero road, where he went as a bootlegger into a trap in which he was shot down in the presence of nine men, four of them officers of the law.

Tidari, as he gave his name in Police court this morning, pleaded not guilty to the charge of unlawful possession of weapons. He was held in \$1,000 bail for continuation tomorrow.
