THE TRAIL OF JAMES MCGRATH

THE FIRST APPEARANCE OF JAMES MCGRATH

There was a James McGrath (b. ~1829) living in the town of Pompey, NY, with Michael McGrath, Michael's son Thomas and Thomas's wife Catherine Gleason McGrath at the time at the 1855 census. James married Bridget Ryan, Catherine Gleason McGrath's niece, who had been living on an adjacent Pompey farm at the time of the 1855 census. In late 1858, James and Bridget McGrath, Thomas and Catherine McGrath, plus some others, migrated to Maple Ridge in the town of Martinsburgh in Lewis Co., NY.

James McGrath's ancestry has proved to be very elusive. After sorting out the McGrath connections in Central NY and Maple Ridge, James still stood alone. Since he was living with Michael and Thomas McGrath in Pompey it had been assumed that he was either family or a neighbor from Ireland. After several attempts, no family connections have been found and so it has been assumed that he was a neighbor from Ireland.

"Jane McGrath Ostrowidzki's grandmother (Katherine Bridget Maher who married Thomas William McGrath, the son of James McGrath and Bridget Ryan) said they (Jane's ancestors) weren't related to the other McGraths in Martinsburgh (the town in which Maple Ridge is located). This statement means that the other Thomas McGrath, John McGrath and Michael McGrath (from Golden, Co. Tipperary) aren't related to James and neither is the elder Thomas McGrath (of Moyaliff). So far her statement has turned out to be true."

The label "Elder" was used to describe the older Thomas McGrath just to avoid confusing the two Thomas McGraths living in Maple Ridge. <u>http://mcgrathsearch.com/Lewis_County.html</u>


Around the end of the 1850s the Michael McGrath family seems to have split up and there was no evidence that they stayed in touch with one another. The existence of Margaret, who had married Richard Long (a former neighbor in Ireland), moved to Maple Ridge and then moved back to the same road where Michael, Thomas and James were living in 1855, was unknown to us. That road, by the way, is now named Long Road. Sometime between 1855 and 1860 Michael McGrath is believed to have passed away. After a careful examination of St. Patrick's Cemetery, at Maple Ridge and its records, it is believed that Michael was not buried there. Hence he died before the migration and was probably buried in old St. Mary's Cemetery on Renwick Ave. There is no record of him being buried there at the time of his death nor was he listed among the identifiable graves that were disinterred in 1958 and reburied in a mass grave in the new St. Mary's in DeWitt.

So, by the early 1860s Edmund was in Cuyler, in Cortland County; Margaret McGrath Long was in Pompey, in Onondaga County (having returned from Maple Ridge); Lanty was in Clifton Springs, in Ontario County and Thomas and James were in Maple Ridge, town of Martinsburgh, in Lewis County. Edmund McGrath's wife, Mary Ryan had two sisters that settled in the Pompey area and we were aware of them and the family interacted with them. One of Catherine Ryan Sheahan's son's went in with Edmund and his two sons as a partner in their 225 acre farm

at the north end of Kettlebail Road at the northern edge of the town of Truxton. However, from Edmund's side of the family there was nothing but total silence. My grandfather, Edmund's grandson, thought the family came to the Truxton area in about 1875. We grew up thinking that Edmund had been an only child, despite the unlikely possibility of that happening in an Irish family in the first quarter of the 19th century.

This would have been a perfect place to show that James was related to the other McGraths living in the same household but he was listed as a "boarder." I think it can be assumed that he might be a cousin or possibly a neighbor from back in Ireland.

One day while looking for some Phelan records in the St. James church records (Cazenovia, Madison Co., NY) I decided to review my Ryan records from St. James and there they were:

67. McGRATH, James married Bridget RYAN 21 October 1855. Priest: James P. Cahill. Witnesses: Thomas Ryan and Catharine Ryan

341. McGRATH, Mary, daughter of James McGRATH and Bridget RYAN, born 17 August, baptized 2 November 1856, at Pompey. Sponsors: Thomas Ryan and Mary Ryan. Priest: M. W. Rooney.

I had found solid evidence of the connection between Onondaga Co and Lewis Co at last.

Thomas Ryan was Bridget's brother. Catharine Ryan has not been identified as yet and Mary Ryan might be the wife of Edmund McGrath. There seems to be a tighter connection between James McGrath and Thomas Ryan than with Thomas McGrath.

Final Analysis

That brings us to the statement of the Bold Hypothesis. Lanty, Edmond, Thomas and Margaret were all siblings and their father was Michael McGrath of Moyaliff.

James and Bridget Ryan McGrath named their children Mary, Thomas, James, Margaret, John, Joseph and Bridget. These names are about as typically Irish as any names one might find. Bridget's parents were Thomas Ryan and Margaret Gleason. Although the birth order doesn't exactly follow the tradition these two names can be pulled off the list and the next two are Mary and James. These might be the names of James' parents or one or both might have had the same names as his wife Bridget's parents.

If James was using the Irish naming convention then his father's name was Thomas, not Michael, as seen in the case of the four siblings above. This is an additional indicator that James was not one of Michael's children. However, perhaps James wasn't a big believer in that method of selecting his children's names.

James did participate in the Maple Ridge Migration and I believe that he did come from the Moyaliff area. Edmund was a baptismal sponsor for one of Lanty's children. Edmund's and Margaret's death certificates listed their father as Michael.

Question: Did James McGrath's death certificate contain the names of his parents?


Finding James McGrath Back in Ireland

On July 8, 2015, the National Library of Ireland put their microfilm collection of the Parish Registers from the Catholic Dioceses on line. (This is the link: <u>http://registers.nli.ie/</u>) Since then I have been transcribing the interesting records from Upperchurch (1829), Clonoulty (1809) and Holycross (1835) parishes into a spreadsheet. The year appearing in the parentheses after the parish name is the year when the records commenced. This gives us a handle on the James McGraths in those parishes whose birth years have been found in various records to be between 1829 and 1835. Several viable candidates have been found and are shown in the table on the next page.

Several James McGraths Found in the Parish Registers for three adjoining RC parishes: Clonoulty, Ballycahill & Holycross and Upperchurch & Drombane. The highlighted James Magraths are discussed in the text.

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THE CONVERGENCE OF MOYALLIFF, CLONOULTY AND HOLYCROSS CIVIL PARISHES

For a distance scale the blue squares are 1 kilometer on each side.

LOCATIONS

East side of Moyaliff Hill – Michael McGrath farm

Ballyoughter, Clareen & Moyaliff – Locations of the Thomas Ryan and Margaret Gleeson family when their three youngest children were born. This was Thomas Ryan and Bridget Ryan's family.

Drumdiha – This is where Michael McGrath's son Edmund was living when his oldest two children were baptized: Margaret (1842), Michael (1843)

Turriheen Lower – This is where the James Magrath and Judith Davern family were living. This would give us a James Magrath who was baptized on Nov 6, 1832.

TOO MANY JAMES MCGRATHS

James was a popular name among the McGraths so there are more than enough candidates. There are far more McGraths in the Clonoulty RC parish, which included the civil parishes of Clogher (north) and Clonoulty (south), than in any of the other surrounding parishes. Based on the Irish naming convention the Thomas Magrath and Anne Maher family of Lisbook, Clonoulty is a possible candidate but Lisbook is in the far southern part of the parish. Based on proximity the James Magrath and Judith Davern family of Turraheen is the most likely. The name James was used twice in this family which means that the younger James had died [then a third James showed up for the same family - discussed below]. Another James Magrath of Turraheen was baptized on Jul 7, 1829. He was the son of Patrick Magrath and Mary Ryan with sponsors: Michael Magrath and Mary Fogarty.

As seen in the map above Turraheen is very close to Drumdiha where my gg-grandfather Edmund McGrath had lived in the early 1840s. Both of these locations are within walking distance (in the 19th century Irish sense of the word) of Moyaliff Hill where Michael McGraths' farm was located on its eastern side. Scattered in the same area were the townlands of Ballyoughter, Clareen and Moyaliff (which to complicate matters is the name of a townland and a civil parish) where Bridget Ryan's family lived at various times. The people from these areas would have known each other as they all traveled to the same market town of Thurles.

The original pick for a James McGrath candidate was James Magrath, baptized Nov 6, 1832, Turraheen, Cloger parish, parents: James Magrath and Judith Davern. But then another James McGrath showed up in the records for that same family. This newest James was baptized Dec. 3, 1836 which implies that the 1832 James had died young. This new James was too young to be the James McGrath being sought. The most likely James McGrath candidates are now: James Magrath, baptized Dec 28, 1828, Lisbook, with parents Thomas Magrath and Anne Maher; James Magrath baptized on Jul 7, 1829 of Turraheen with parents Patrick Magrath and Mary Ryan.

The Lisbook James Magrath selection gives up the geographic proximity of the Turraheen Magraths. However, it is in agreement with a partial application of the Irish naming tradition by James McGrath and Bridget Ryan in naming their first son Thomas. The proximity of Lisbook to the Moyaliff area is not a real issue because that was where James Magrath's parents were living when he was baptized. By 1850 James could have been working on a farm in the Moyaliff area and that was how he came to know the Michael Magrath and other families. The Turraheen James Magrath retains the geographic proximity to the McGrath, Ryan and Gleeson families and he had a "Michael Magrath" as one of his baptism sponsors but he loses the use of the naming tradition in the naming of his children. Since these two James Magraths are only about six months apart in age it appears that this search has ended in a tie.

EXAMPLES OF THE PARISH REGISTERS FOR CLONOULTY RC PARISH

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Thomas McGrath married Anne Maher on 19 Feb 1828. Their residence was Lisbouicke, now Lisbook.


James McGrath, baptized on 28 Dec 1828. Residence was Lisbook.

Alice Magrath was baptized on 26 Apr 1841. The residence was Lisbook.





This information came from the obituaries of Mayme McGrath (May 1, 1919) and of her father Thomas William McGrath (Aug. 18, 1929). Thomas William McGrath was the 2nd child of James McGrath and Bridget Ryan. Cities listed under the names are their respective cities of residence given in the obits. Additional information was obtained from the census records for the years 1900, 1910 and 1920.



Miss Mayme McGrath was the daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Thomas W. McGrath (Katherine Bridget Maher). She was born in New Boston, NY on Sept. 10, 1889 and died on May 1, 1919. Her survivors, in addition to her parents, were her brothers James McGrath who was in the service and William McGrath of Lowville; sisters Mrs. William Breen (Gertrude) and Miss Beatrice McGrath, both of Syracuse, and sisters Elizabeth, Katherine (Kathleen), Vivian and Arlene (Eileen) all of Lowville, NY. 
